Superintendent Report: November Board Meeting Submitted on November 16, 2023

ADMINISTRATIVE WORK:

Since our last board meeting, our administrative staff, in collaboration with our teacher-leaders, have led the half-day of professional learning on 10/25 and a mentor-mentee meeting on 10/27. During these sessions, we focused on our district's school improvement plan as well as best practices for instruction and student engagement.

Mr. Andrews, Ms. Dupuis, and I met with a data analysis team on October 30 to help us understand and dissagregate our PSAT and SAT data. From this meeting we learned protocols to take back to our staff. We have a math department meeting scheduled for November 27 to dive deeper into our data.

On November 1, I attended the ISOA meeting with Jason Mellema and representatives from school boards around the county. We toured the newly constructed NorthStar School and recently updated Heartwood School on the IISD campus. Immediately after this meeting, I slid into the county-wide instructional leaders meeting to preview and discuss *The Reading Brain*, a documentary produced by WKAR about how children learn to read. The principals and I continue to work our way through *The Art & Science of Teaching* by Robert Marzano.

The administrative team and I met with our technology coaches and director on November 7. We debriefed tech challenges and technology wins for the first marking period and began planning for the future. As a result of this meeting, we have assembled a slightly larger K-12 technology committee that will meet on an ad hoc basis.

I was excited to see that we have some staff members taking advantage of the coaching services provided by Opportunity Thrive. On November 8, OT Founder Rebekah Schipper and I discussed the results of the personal wellness inventory taken by our staff members, and there is a definite need for this type of support for our beloved teachers.

FACILITIES:

Rick Miller is working closely with our students who attend the Wilson Talent Center's welding program to design a three-dimensional Dansville "D" to be displayed in the high school commons. We can't wait to see the results! Mr. Miller has also been adding warmth throughout the buildings via the use of color. Nearly everyday, I discover a nice change to our building atmosphere.

A small group of staff members and administrators as well as one board member met on November 13 to discuss potential projects in the district, including:

- Enhancing the pole vault pit
- Adding a sidewalk at the soccer field
- Addressing drainage issues on the soccer field
- Elements of the conservation project for agriscience
- Netting to protect spectators from foul balls
- The likelihood of upgrading lighting on the football field and/or adding lighting to the soccer, softball, and baseball fields (not likely any time soon)

Mr. Andrews, Mr. Dassance, and I attended a CMAC meeting on November 6 in Perry. The rising cost of officiating games may eventually lead to increased ticket pricing at the varsity level. All schools in CMAC chose to increase the price of middle school tickets this year and will make a decision on high school events for the following year. Potterville debriefed their decision on playing a JV-only football program this past season. It is not recommended that schools take this route moving forward—even with young, developing teams.

SAFETY:

We continue to focus on safety for our staff and students. The directors and building administrators met with Jason Russell on November 14 to review best practices for handling a violent intruder in the building. All three buildings reviewed ALICE protocols and scenarios in an age appropriate manner during our safety drill on November 16. Window hammers have recently been purchased for classrooms that needed a secondary escape route.
