Secondary Students Return for In-Person Instruction

Dansville Schools has offered both in-person and online instruction for students in grades BK-6 since the start of school on August 18, 2020.

Thanks to the work of our staff to create a viable plan and schedule, along with the fact that our staff had the chance to be vaccinated starting the week of January 11, 2021, Dansville Schools announced at the January Board of Education meeting that we hoped to bring back our secondary students for in-person instruction starting in February.

We are happy to report that we planned to open for in-person instruction on February 16. This was delayed due to poor road conditions, but students were able to safely return on February 17. Our teachers are working had to continue to offer online instruction for students in grades 7-12.

We are very thankful to our amazing staff for providing the most safe and best possible education throughout this year of pandemic learning.

We have welcomed **several new families** into our Aggie Family this year who have quickly been accepted and loved as family members. Whether we were able to get to know and love them for this one school year or if they choose to stay, we are always better and stronger when we have the chance to learn and grow by getting to know people outside of our typical circles and we are grateful for these new relationships.

No Aggie Left Behind

We can't reflect on what our strengths are here without talking about our community.

I couldn't even count how many times since last spring that community members called, texted or stopped by to find out what they can do to help our families and our school.



Dansville Schools Go All-In with Spring Math

When administrators at Dansville Schools first heard Dr. Amanda VanDerHeyden, researcher and education consultant, speak about math intervention, they were struck by her research and ideas for combating the math skills crisis. So, when Dr. VanDerHeyden's ideas came to fruition in the form of Spring Math, Dansville Schools jumped at the chance to participate.

"We heard through the grapevine that a program had been developed and we couldn't wait to get started," said Amy Hodgson, Dansville Schools superintendent. "It's not typical for us to jump into something mid-year, but we understood and trusted Amanda's background and felt this would be a great fit for our students."

The district went all-in with Spring Math, implementing the solution in all classes in grades K-8 for the first year and added high school during the second semester of year two.

It's in our DNA

Spring Math has become "part of the district's DNA," and is leveraged by teachers daily — even on field trip and special dress-up days.

"We've always struggled with math. Not just at Dansville, but in the entire state of Michigan. We had a group of K-12 teachers who worked very hard to develop curriculum that would foster and grow basic skills," Hodgson explained. "Their hearts were in the right

place, but there wasn't any data to back it up. Were kids actually proficient in math or were they just proficient on the day of the test? Spring Math changed that."


Spring Math provides the data that administrators and teachers need to help students become proficient in math at both classroom and individual levels. The platform also provides timely feedback regarding students' progress, so educators can provide specific intervention until students reach mastery.

"A special education teacher was giving one of our students Tier 3 intervention at the time of our Spring Math pilot. The data showed he'd reached mastery on a particular skill, but the teacher wasn't sure," Hodgson shared. "When we looked at his screening data the following fall, it showed he had retained mastery even over the summer! It meant so much to the student and the teacher and helped provide a lot of credibility about the power of the tool."

Every day means every day

In the spring of 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic forced Dansville Schools into remote learning with one day's notice. Despite being a pencil-and-paper-driven program, usage of Spring Math continued. The expectation had been set: Spring Math is done every day — even online — to avoid gaps and increase proficiency. With

this in mind, teachers printed Spring Math packets for students to take home, and most importantly, students followed through with the protocol from home.

"Because it's done every day, Spring Math becomes routine for the kids. We were told that they were actually explaining it to their parents," said Hodgson. "Doing Spring Math at home was easier for the kids than we expected. There was some adapting needed, but the resources provided made it something we could continue virtually and we're glad we did."

Dansville welcomed most of its students back to the classroom for the 2020-2021 school year. But, with the pandemic still raging, Dansville had to prepare to take Spring Math virtual once again. COVID-19 precautions pushed us to get creative for completing math screening — an important step to show proficiency and areas of improvement. Dansville safely screened nearly every K-8 student – even if that meant sitting outside in a lawn chair to do it.

Dansville's math interventionists also continued to find ways to provide individual intervention for the students who needed it most all year — even for students who remained virtual all year. Several students were able to move out of individual intervention during this pandemic learning year, which has been very encouraging.

The nearly 25% of K-6 students who chose a virtual learning option also continued with Spring Math. Teachers provided remote students with weekly, printed packets, which were required to be completed daily, just as they would have been in the classroom.

Consistent application yields consistent progress

With support from Spring Math, Dansville is truly accelerating math achievement for every student.

Despite the impact of the pandemic on teaching and learning, growth has continued, as demonstrated in the chart on page six comparing second grade assessment scores in 2019-20 and 2020-21.

Dansville's administrators believe so strongly in Spring Math's efficacy that it's become a required part of the district's core mathematics curriculum – with each teacher working with consulting with Spring Math's team to determine how to sustain and refine effective implementation.



How Do I Know if My Child Is Ready for Kindergarten?

Dansville Elementary School works with families in a team approach to help make decisions about the appropriate placement of incoming students.

- **Maturity levels** Some children seem too young or not ready for school in March, but remember that children change a lot between March and late August.
- **Ability to focus** This improves with age, but there are things that can be implemented at home to help with this such as:
 - Maintain a daily routine including regular mealtimes, snacks, and bedtimes.
 - Provide plenty of play time indoors and outdoors
 - Read and write with your child
 - Introduce numbers and counting to your child
- **Behavioral concerns** Something to consider as preparation for Kindergarten is how much socialization outside of the home has / does my child experience? It can be a little overwhelming for a 5-year-old child who has primarily been home with little experience with other kids to then be put into a classroom with twenty other students. Some ideas to consider are:
 - Take your child to public places where there are other children to interact with
 - Organize play groups with friends or family with other children close to the same age
 - Join age appropriate clubs and recreational sporting leagues or pursue hobbies with playmates



Encourage your child to talk to a teacher or counselor and to visit the office to fill out a reporting sheet.

Parents should always feel comfortable to report concerns to their student's building office.



Bullying is when someone repeatedly and on purpose says or does mean or hurtful things to another person who has a hard time defending himself or herself. The three key components of bullying behavior are: (a) aggressive behavior that involves unwanted, negative actions; (b) a pattern of behavior repeated over time; and (c) an imbalance of power or strength.

As defined by Dr. Dan Olweus, a research professor of psychology who has been researching bullying since the 1970s. Dr. Olweus developed the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program and it is the most researched and widely adopted bullying prevention program in the world.





Dansville Schools Partners with Capital Area District Library for Student Success Initiative

Dansville Schools, in partnership with the Capital Area District Library (CADL), is working to provide all students with free access



to CADL's educational and entertainment resources.

Through this initiative, students automatically receive a virtual library card. It gives them access to books, audio books magazines and more in both digital and physical formats.

No physical card is issued—students simply use a school district code with their username as their card number. Students or their guardians may opt out by requesting a form from the school. No overdue fines are charged for physical items, but students and parents are responsible for returning them to a CADL branch.

Please contact your student's building office if you have not received your student's username.

What Can Students Do with the Card?

- Check out Hotspots and Chromebook Kits
- Check out Bus and Zoo Passes
- Borrow three physical books, audio books or magazines at a time. Items can be placed on hold and picked up at your desired branch.
- Use CADL's Download & Streaming services and access Research & Learn resources.





Dresden Simon ('15) won the Mid-American Conference championship in the 141 pound weight class for the second year in a row, qualifying for the NCAA Championships.



Dre is ranked 11th and was the No. 2 seed and earned the Outstanding Wrestler Award at the 2020 MAC Championships. He also earned All-America honors from the National Wrestling Coaches Association in 2020 and was named to the All-America Second Team.

At Dansville, Dre was a four-year letter winner, three-year team captain, posted a 207-12 record, compiled 56 wins and placed first at 140 pounds in the MHSAA Division IV State Finals his senior year. Dre finished 58-0 as a junior, winning the Division IV state title at 130 pounds and ranked No. 1 in the state, regardless of division, in his weight class following junior season. He placed second in the MHSAA State Finals as a sophomore, compiling a 47-4 record and placed third in the MHSAA State Finals as a freshman, finishing the season at 49-7. Dre was also the 2016 FloNationals champion, earning All-America honors at the USAW Cliff Keen Folkstyle Nationals in 2014 and in 2015.

We are so proud of Dre on all of these amazing accomplishments for how well he represents himself and our Aggie Family at this elite level!


After Dansville, Adam walked on at the University of Michigan, played at Lansing Community College and at Wayne State University.
